NANCY MAAS Demo

At our January demo, Nancy began by stating that what motivates her creative drive in art is the process itself. The process she has developed for creating beautiful watercolor paintings is quite unique, as SWA members witnessed at our meeting. Her technique, watercolor weaving, was highlighted in a short video, followed by a live demo. The basic steps are:

- 1. Create a spontaneous painting, not worrying too much at this point about details.
- 2. Create a second painting somewhat similar to the first painting but perhaps brighter in color and looser in technique. Tip: Don't have too much contrast in color between the two paintings or the process won't work as well. Nancy suggests putting color down once and leaving it to retain as much freshness and brightness as possible.

- 3. Cut the first painting into vertical strips (scary!) and the second into horizontal strips and interweave them into a new painting. Define the new painting's shapes and values to enhance the composition and final look.
- 4. Affix final painting (she uses Lineco's neutral pH adhesive) to an archival substrate such as archival mat board. Nancy works on a plexiglass sheet so that she can try out different backgrounds to see what color works best for the background.


As Nancy explained, this type of painting is about using overall dynamism and movement rather than a central focal point to create an exciting composition. You can see the beautiful results of this painting process below.





February Demo Artist Darla Bostick On Being an Artist:

I have been an art student my entire life and an art educator for 40 years...teaching all ages. At Texas Tech University I earned my BFA. I am proud to say I am a past president of Society of Watercolor Artists. Each year I lead two workshop/retreats (June and Oct) at Ghost Ranch in NM and Branson, MO. I also lead an annual Art Adventures Abroad (we have been to Spain, Portugal and Ireland). My work has been shown in many juried national and international exhibitions.

To declare oneself an artist is a great revelation! We create and touch others with our creations. My desire is to show others the world as I see it, through my photographs, paintings, drawings, mosaics, prints...whatever media carries my vision.

The greatest gift an artist possesses is to touch the life of another person. Through art, much can be said without

speaking a word. As an educator I have the privilege (and responsibility) to encourage and, hopefully, make a difference in another person's way of perceiving the world around them, thinking of new ideas and creating a tangible piece of their vision.

My motto is "Art is Life!" Live it to the fullest and make a difference to someone every day.





Opinion The Value of Watercolor By Laurin McCracken

The question comes to me in many forms. How do we advance the reputation of watercolor? How do we get over the age-old prejudices against our medium? How do we reposition the value of watercolor in the minds of collectors and gallery owners and print journalists and museum directors? How do we combat the idea that watercolor is a fugitive medium? How do we address the price differential between watercolor paintings and those painted in oil or acrylic?



I believe the answer lies with watercolorists. We need to believe in our medium. We need to be more publicly supportive of our medium.

We have to be the champions of our medium.

I was recently in a discussion with several watercolorists about this issue. One said that he did not call himself a watercolorist, but was just an artist to avoid the stigma associated with watercolor. Another asked why would he want to be identified with a lesser art form and therefore he called himself a painter. I think that this approach is wrong, wrong and seriously detrimental to our goal of advancing the recognition of watercolor as a superior art medium.

I think each one of us who prides themselves on the creation of quality art through the medium of watercolor should stand up and shout, "I am a watercolorist, I am proud to be a watercolorist, and I am proud of my medium, watercolor."

How can we get anyone to believe that watercolor is an equal to or better art form if we hide our pride under a basket and duck our heads rather than admit that our chosen medium is flipping fantastic?

Many times, we are our own worst enemy. I recently saw the price listing of paintings by 30 top watercolorists from all over the country. All of the paintings were of the same size and offered for sale unframed, in my mind a real "apples-to-apples" comparison. The prices ranged from a few hundred dollars to a few thousand. If we are so uncertain about the value of our art, how can the public be wiser?

We are beginning to see a number of examples of artists who have moved the price point (Yes, let's face reality and talk about sales in the language of the marketplace, such as price-point and all that terminology) of their paintings up in the galleries in which their work is shown.

Over the past 5 years, I have been able to move the price of my full sheet paintings from \$2,800 to over \$5,000. A number of my watercolor friends have greatly exceeded those price points. Agreed, you have to be in the right gallery in the right geographic area of the country.

There are also many stories of watercolorists selling their paintings online for prices in the thousands. But, if you price your paintings in the hundreds, that is what you will get for them and you will be supporting the public's lower opinion about the value of watercolors.

You have to get away from your painting board and understand the dynamics of the retail art market. If you just sit back and complain that no one is paying enough money for your paintings, then you are doomed to selling your paintings at under their value.

If you are sitting there waiting for a top gallery to find you and sell your work at top dollar, you are in for a shock. It isn't going to happen. If you want success in the market you have to work to make that success happen.

If you only want to sell your paintings in Memphis, TN, then you have to be aware that Memphis is a \$350 watercolor market. If you are not willing to go where you can get a better price, then you have no reason to complain. If you want to sell your paintings for thousands of dollars, you have to find galleries that will and can sell your paintings at those prices. They exist, probably not just down your street and around the corner.

Fort Worth is not a city that values watercolors. The top prices in local galleries rarely exceed \$1,000. And it usually has to be a painting of Bluebonnets. There are a lot of very wealthy people in Fort Worth; but they don't, as a rule, buy their paintings locally. They go to New York, London or Paris. This is just a fact of life. You can't sit on the corner of Main Street and 7th and cry about the fact that you can't get the value you want for your watercolors in Fort Worth.

On the other hand, Fort Worth's annual Main Street art show attracts fine painters, sculptors, print makers. etc. from all over the country. I have talked with watercolorists who are selling \$50,000 to \$150,000 and more worth of paintings during the four days of the fair. Most told me that they do three to six fairs a year. Those artists know their market, work hard to create a volume of work, and are willing to work the fair circuit to enjoy a very high standard of living.

If we continue to look for and support those establishments that do treat us and our work with respect, we will raise the value of watercolor across the marketplace, across the country, and around the world.

If I could, I would wear an insignia on my collar that proclaims I am a watercolorist, just the way I wore my captain's bars when I was in the Corps of Engineers of the US Army. I was proud of being an officer serving my country, and I am equally proud to be a watercolorist.

We all need to become advocates and educators in this cause. We need to submit our best work to competitions. We need to attend those exhibitions. We need to support galleries and exhibition spaces that show watercolor. We need to go to opening nights for shows for other watercolor artists.

Each of us plays a part in making watercolor a more important and desired medium. Get out there and spread the message. Watercolor is great!











Dogwood Trails CelebrationPalestine, Texas





The weekend for our **Palestine Paint-Out** is March 31-April 1, to coincide with the 80th Annual Dogwood Trails Celebration. David Tripp, who is coordinating this event, has arranged a special rate for paint-out participants at The Redlands Historic Inn. The Redlands, built in 1914 and extensively renovated, is located downtown, within walking distance of restaurants and shopping. Each of its 20 available rooms is uniquely furnished. The hotel has quite an interesting history and is now listed on the National Register of Historic Places as a preserved structure of historical significance.

According to a Palestine Visitors Guide, "Palestine is a charming East Texas town that boasts more than 1,800 historic sites, including the Main Street District."

In other words, plenty of painting opportunities as well as fun events during the dogwood celebration!

Our flexible itinerary looks like this.

(Participants can always feel free to choose their own activities):

- Arrive Saturday morning and rendezvous at The Gallery of The dands Hotel.
- Disperse and paint 'til lunch.
- Meet somewhere close for lunch.
- Paint 'til dinner.
- Meet at the hotel restaurant for dinner.
- Sunday Paint as long as we want, then head home.
