Interview with Kim Collins, our March Demo Artist

Kim has an upcoming solo show "Fluid Nature" at Fort Worth Community Art Center during the month of April; the reception is April 7th from 6 pm to 9 pm.

What artist(s) have inspired you and why?

So many artists have inspired me over the years that it's hard to single out particular artists. I find that my current "favorite" changes with time...depending upon my interests and goals. I like both artists from the past and the present. I have always loved Impressionism...although the abstract expressionists have grown on me...Helen Frankenthaler, Franz Kline, Gerhard Richter, Motherwell, Diebenkorn and more. Living artists—Linda Kemp for her exceptional negative painting technique, Krista Harris for her expressive nature abstracts...as well as Charlotte Foust. Too many to name...all artists have something for us to learn...and I try to study the techniques and "feel" of those who move me.



Could you talk about your painting technique?

I have more than one "technique" that I use...I like to "mix it up" to keep things interesting and to keep me from doing the same old thing over and over. I don't want my work to become boring and expected.

What are some of your favorite things, or things that are essential to your well being/success as an artist?

The only thing truly essential to me as an artist is a love for what I'm doing and authenticity in my work (the work is my own and not a derivative of some other person's "heart".)

What are your go-to paints/colors?

I love, love, love Golden fluid and high flow acrylic paints! And I love titanium white and carbon black! With these paints, the only limit is my own (sometimes anemic) imagination. I always have a range of "primaries" to choose from...reds, yellows and blues...they vary from painting to painting depending upon the mood I'm trying to establish. Prussian Blue always makes me happy!

What would be your advice to artists who are just getting started in their career?

Do it because you love it; anything else is gravy. Work hard, get better, it takes time...have fun.

What's the best advice you've received as an artist?

Paint, paint, paint, paint! This is how you find your "voice", this is how you learn and grow.

If you could live anywhere, where would that be?

Wherever I am...it's always tempting to think someplace else would be better, but it's probably not.

What memorable responses have you had to your artwork? My favorite response is, "I love it!"

Is the artistic life lonely? What do you do to counteract it?

It can be lonely in the studio...but being alone and having time to think are essential to creative thought process. Have things outside of the studio....family, friends, other artists and other interests, and don't be afraid to take some time off to recharge. I like to grab my camera and go see what I can find...always fun for me.

What is a day in the life of artist Kim Collins like?

First and foremost.....coffee!!!! In the morning, I like to take time to think, read, meditate. I'm usually in the studio (which is away from my house) by 10:00 or so and stay until around 4:00 most days...then home to family and having the evening together.

Review of David Tripp's One Man Show in Palestine, TX



Country Blues

The Gallery at Redlands, 400 N. Queen St., Palestine, Texas, opened its doors for the first time with a one-man-show featuring SWA Member David Tripp's watercolors and drawings. In this single naturally lighted chamber, 104 original pieces weave a tapestry of experiences and sensations spanning this artist's life sojourn from a trolley train leaning into an urban curve to a guitar-picking bluesman perched on the shaded porch of a desolate farm house. All of these scenes depict a disappearing America that thrived in the 1950's but today leaves only the shells of buildings and vehicles, mere shadows of once vital homes and communities.

David Tripp has been absorbed with the contributions of Andrew Wyeth and Edward Hopper, with their urban and country watercolors depicting settings of loneliness and isolation. Viewers who enjoy these works feel a connection with the scenes of our passing yet enduring America, and understand this dual sentiment of loss and presence—loss because something that once thrived in the setting is no longer living, presence because some kind of footprint remains, and we can still sense it as we linger in that space.

The show runs through April 9 and the Gallery is open Friday, Saturday and Sunday 10 am - 5 pm.

"I am Laurie Goldstein-Warren and I live in West Virginia. I have been painting watercolors for sixteen years. Art has always been a part of my life. When I was young, ballet, tap and jazz dancing was my creative outlet. I was a dancer in the Rochester Academy of Performing Arts dance troupe until the age of 18. Later on my creative path took me to hair styling. I opened my own salon in New York and competed in fantasy hair competitions. I loved these particular shows because you had to create something never seen before, more avante garde than styles you would see on the street.

When I moved to West Virginia in 1998 and found myself in the countryside, I went back to one of my first creative loves, art. After many years of studying the art of watercolor with some fantastic teachers and mentors, I have been so fortunate to have found success in this field. My artwork has been shown all over this country and has been exhibited in Canada, China and Japan. I now enjoy teaching my workshops and jurying exhibits around the country. I found my voice in art... find yours....Create!"

Workshop Materials List

Each student will need to bring the following materials:

Paint colors: Quinacridone Gold – Daniel Smith

Quinacridone Rose - Daniel Smith

Cobalt Blue - Winsor & Newton or Daniel Smith

Antwerp Blue – Winsor & Newton Lamp Black – Winsor & Newton

Adjustable nozzle Spray Bottle - Make sure you can spray and get big drops

Butcher Tray Palette (I use an 11" X 15") We will be using BIG brushes Water Bucket

Hair dryer

Backing Board/Gator Board (large enough for ½ sheet) We will be painting 22" X 16"

Tape rolls or something to raise your board at least 2"

Brushes: 2" or 3" Hake Brush, #12 Round, 1 ½" Flat Brush, #8 Round with good point tip, a stiff bristle ½" or ½" flat brush (Continued on next page)



Masking Fluid (I use Pebeo drawing gum) It can be dried with a hair dryer and lifts easily from your paper Masking tape


Towels and Kleenex tissue

Watercolor Paper (I always use Fabriano Artistico bright white 140 lb.) It has the greatest "lifting" capability than any other paper I've tried. If you don't have it, bring a good quality 140 lb. watercolor paper. We will use 2-3 sheets. Pencils (HB or #2 hardness)

A good soft eraser

Transfer paper (wax-free) Can be found at A.C. Moore or most art supply outlets on the internet. This can be shared between students/each sheet can be used several times. I get mine from Dick Blick – Sally's wax free Graphite Paper.

Laurie will be supplying a pre-drawn portrait sketch to transfer if you want to follow along with her painting. You can also feel free to bring your own photo reference/sketch of a portrait if you prefer. Bring any photos you may want to work on in the future if you would like to discuss composition ideas for that portrait. The last day of class, bring in a painting you've worked on to discuss how this approach might improve it or just if you would like to receive some input on your work.


